Letter from the President

OACYC Strategy for Regulation of the Field

Objective: To ensure optimal care for children, youth and their families in-care, education, and their community.

Methods:

- Create a letter to go out to employers of CYC's or potential employers with the one pagers about CYC's about why our profession is important.

- Create a social media campaign educating employers why they should hire CYC's.

Goal #3: Educate the general public about CYCPs.

Methods:

- · Create a social media campaign about CYC's.
- Encourage all to share, re-tweet, etc

DLE Training to Trainer

As CYC's we know that making meaningful moments with children and youth is a core philosophy for us, however, the Purposeful Use of Daily Life Events (DLE) training will offer specific insight into the micro-seconds of a single moment that could change a child's life forever.

Through the 2-day training workshop you will explore topics such as the foundations, themes and opportunities, meaning-making, the process of change and of course, intervening into daily life events. Your trainer will delve into and break down each category into single seconds, making you re-think your approach and re-discover who you want to be as a CYC.



It's the little things. The routines and rituals; events, such as school or work or the evolving daily circumstances, like mom getting pregnant, that true work can take place. As stated in the DLE Participants Guide, "Focusing on small important moments and experiences is

a part of the history of working with young people," (2018). We know this as a foundation and breaking it down into smaller parts over the 2 days of training, helps put things into perspective. Thom Garfat, one of the creators of this training,

once said, "the meaning of the moment

is defined by your response to it". thought into our daily interactions.

are another topic that show up in our within this training. It will teach you therapeutic opportunities and to view perspectives. Remember, all behaviours interpret what that need may be.

This statement alone, evokes so much

wonderful training, you'll start to piece look at the interventions. These do not

have to be all encompassing, well planned out interventions. Interventions can take place in seconds and may catch you off guard, but first, you need to notice. You need to make the choice to notice. Being self-aware and actively participating in your self-awareness is a must. You owe it to the children and youth you work with to be conscious of self at all times. Don't make assumptions. This is a mistake we've all made and may continue to make; but if you're working on it and bettering yourself to be more present in the moments, then that's all we can ask for. Although some situations call for a reaction, don't be a reactive worker. Work on being a proactive worker to situations, breaking down those moments and recognizing the need for intervention before it occurs.

Not only have I learned through this two-day training, I've also travelled to Winnipeg to become a trainer in this inspiring workshop as I believe in it so much. I would recommend this training for anyone who hasn't received it yet, as it will inspire and open your eyes to a continuous way of being with children and youth. It takes moments and breaks them down, making you a better CYC for it.

While on placement in a grade 3 classroom I was working with a young boy to develop his anger management skills. It felt like anything I tried did not work with him and that he would continue to not talk to me. Then one day, out of the blue during class, he came up to me and calmly said to me "Jacob, I'm feeling mad right now and I need to go for a walk". At this moment, I realized that being a CYCP is learning to understand that everything you do does have an impact on the children and youth you're working with – even if you can't see it day-to-day. This is my most memorable CYC moment.

The most important thing a CYCP can do for a young person:

I believe that the single most important thing that a CYCP can do for a young person is to listen to them. Actually listen, hear what they are saying and empathize and acknowledge what they are saying too.



Legislation Update

Firstly, I wanted to take this opportunity to thank all those individuals who paved the path for this association to continue with advocacy efforts at becoming a legislated profession. It is those dedicated people, and their tireless efforts at pursuing this cause that allows for continued engagement to be at the forefront of the OACYC agenda. Secondly, I welcome those who choose to continue, as well as those who would like to join this committee as new members. Although the last few months have been a transitional period for both this committee and the OACYC Board itself, rest assured that steps have been take to continue with our legislative endeavor. This includes the appointment of a new Committee Chair and Board Director, myself, Patrick Frackowiak. As well, with the recent provincial election the OACYC has reached out to the newly appointed Hon. Christine Elliott, Minister of



Health and Long-Term Care, and the Hon. Lisa MacLeod, Minister of Children, Community and Social Services. Letters to both Ministers were sent on behalf of the association, outlining the crucial importance of safeguarding the well-being of children and youth across this province by qualified professionals, which currently is not the case, as anyone is able to call themselves a child and youth care practitioner.



Conveying the importance of addressing this paramount issue, the OACYC requested a meeting with both Ministers. In response, I am happy to report that the Hon. Lisa MacLeod replied to the aforementioned letter, agreeing to meet with the OACYC. Unfortunately, this meeting has been cancelled by the Minister's office due to scheduling; however, the association has asked for another meeting date to be scheduled. While the above efforts unfolded during the summer months, the OACYC Board also voted on a motion to hire an outside agency to conduct and strategize a plan toward legislative efforts. This plan, which was recently presented to the OACYC membership during the September 22nd AGM may be viewed below. With the below plan as the foundation for our legislative attainment moving forward, I invite all members to partake in providing feedback by taking a moment to reflect on and specify language relevant to our field. Help us in promoting our voice as a profession by taking a moment and forwarding your response to the below goal by e-mailing office@oacyc.org. Your response will be compiled along with other member's feedback to begin a dialogue which can be conveyed in a form of a report, outlying our field and importance of its regulation.

Goal 1

Establish a united language about our field, regulation and how to ask for it. I, along with the OA-CYC welcome any member interested in joining this legislative committee and thank in advance those providing feedback to Goal 1, as outlined above. There is much work to be done while we outline, plan and execute efforts aimed at continued advocacy toward a legislative Child and Youth Care profession. As these efforts unfold in the coming months, the OACYC will continue to update our members.

Diversity & Inclusion Time for Repair & Transformation

This is the suggested pathway that was recommended using a Restorative lens and approach to address the issues and challenges to hear and ensure there are diverse voices and perspectives represented and included in all aspects of the OACYC.

The pathway needs to be staged over three broad stages.

Stage 1: Preparation: Cleaning the lenses

"We see the world, not as it is, but as we are-or, as we are conditioned to see it." Steve Covey

For the leadership to engage in reflective sessions for:

- 1. Understanding implicit bias
- 2. Acknowledging privilege and its absence
- 3. Levering privilege to be an ally

Stage 2: Repair and Restore

"The wound is the place where the Light enters you." Rumi

- 1. Go forward in teams of at least two.... Allyship
- (Note: This is intended to ensure that true listening can occur).
- 2. Conduct a series of virtual (e.g Facebook) and actual listening circles using restorative questions
- a. Circle 1: Ensuring voice and search for understanding. Hear and collect from current, past and prospective members what they see and experience as : Facts, thoughts, impacts, needs
- b. Circle 2: Design solutions and make recommendations. Based on the first round of circles bring summary of the collective input, identify key priorities and make recommendations for solutions which includes: actions to repair, restore, transform and responsibility for actions (individual and shared).

Stage 3: Transformation
